1	THE COURT: Total?
2	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
3	Q From your time of arrival until the firearm
4	was actually found, how long approximately had passed?
5	A Very quickly. Until we got into the room, it
6	was very quick. It was only a minute or two for
7	Common to get inside the bathroom and Officer
8	S observed the bullets on top of the dresser.
9	MS. Land : I have no further questions
10	for this witness.
11	THE COURT: Cross examine, Mr. Sisto?
12	MR. SISTO: Yes, Your Honor.
13	CROSS EXAMINATION BY MR. SISTO:
14	Q Officer, you made a point to testify that the
15	warrant that you were there to serve for Mr. Waste
16	said, "use caution," correct?
17	A Yes, sir.
18	Q And you believe that the basis for that was a
19	resisting arrest conviction Mr. Was had?
20	A Something like that, sir.
21	Q Well, tell me exactly what you believe the
22	basis was to use caution?
23	A I would have to check the NCIS. It said
24	something in there something with the officers
25	resisting or I don't recall exactly what it said.

1	but use caution was on top of the first page we
2	
3	
4	Q Were you aware that this resisting charge you
5	
6	
7	A No, sir. The NCIS gives you a little footnote
8	explaining to use caution.
9	Q Were you aware, sir, that this charge
10	disposed of in municipal court was disposed of in some
11	time in the 1980's?
12	A No, sir.
13	Q Now, you testified that upon entering the
14	home, Jasked you if he can get dressed, correct?
15	A We were still in the breezeway when he asked
16	that.
17	Q The breezeway is part of the home; is it not,
18	sir?
19	A We were at the doorway of it. It's a little
20	combination of both. It's a glass breezeway and
21	Q You have to go through a door to enter the
22	breezeway, correct?
23	A The door was opened.
24	Q Sir, do you understand my question?
25	A Not really.

]	Q This breezeway isn't just an open gazebo type
2	
3	
4	Q This is an area that someone needs permission
5	
6	A Yes, sir.
7	Q It's connected to the home?
8	A It was locked, yes, sir.
9	Q And you stated that Mr. Was not
10	handcuffed while he was in the bedroom?
11	A No. That is where we did handcuff him, in the
12	bedroom.
13	Q But you stated that he was not handcuffed at
14	the time that he was placed under arrest, right or
15	excuse me. You are saying that he wasn't handcuffed
16	at the time he made the statement about the gun?
17	A Correct, sir.
18	Q And you also stated that you just did a quick
19	search of the bathroom and the bedroom?
20	A Yes. The bathroom inside the bedroom.
21	Q There is nothing to stop you from searching
22	the bathroom as thoroughly as you wanted, right, sir?
23	A I was just looking for persons or objects that
24	can harm me.
25	Q Can you hear me, okay, sir?

1	A Yes, sir.
2	Q Did anyone try to stop you from searching the
3	
4	A No, sir.
5	Q Now, you didn't have a warrant to search the
6	home of the residence, correct?
7	A Correct, sir.
8	Q You did have arrest warrants for both James
9	Water and Called Market, correct?
10	A Yes, sir.
11	Q You were aware that they both lived at 239
12	Road?
13	A Yes.
14	Q Now, if they both presented themselves at the
15	front door, you would have no reason to enter the
16	home, correct?
17	A Unless they requested to get dressed, yes.
18	Q Is that a yes?
19	MS. Land I I think he did answer it,
20	Your Honor.
21	A Unless he asked me to get dressed, I wouldn't
22	have entered the house. Did I answer your question?
23	Q You also had an arrest warrant for Common?
24	A Yes, but she didn't come to the front door, yes.
25	Q If they both presented themselves at the

1	front door, they would have been arrested at the front
2	(Jahr
3	A As long as they had proper clothing on.
4	Q And from the front door, they would have been
5	transported to the police station?
6	A Yes, sir.
7	Q There was a man named Wall and Johnson that
8	answered the knock at the door, right?
9	A Yes.
10	Q And this was around 5:40 a.m.?
11	A Yes.
12	Q And you asked William if James was home?
13	A Yes.
14	Q You said nothing about Carres at the time?
15	A No, sir.
16	Q You concede that you did have an arrest
17	warrant at the time for her, correct?
18	A I did have an arrest warrant for her.
19	Q So you gave W no reason to ask for
20	Called to come to the door?
21	A Correct.
22	Q You expected that Call and James would be
23	sleeping at 5:40 in the morning, right?
24	A Sure.
25	Q Walley James was asleep when you arrived

1	there, right?
2	A Yes.
3	Q And at 5:40 in the morning, that came as no
4	surprise, did it?
5	A That he was sleeping?
6	Q Yes.
7	A I don't think so, no.
8	Q And Warman went to get James as per your
9	request, right?
10	A Yes.
11	Q And James came to the door moments later?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q So Warran was cooperating with you when he
14	went and got Jame?
15	A Yes.
16	Q And J cooperated when he came to the door
17	moments later, correct?
18	A Yes, sir.
19	Q James then cooperated by identifying himself
20	when he came to the door, right?
21	A Yes, sir.
22	Q And you testified during the direct you had a
23	picture of Mr. Wester, right?
24	A Yes, sir.
25	Q There's no mention of this picture in your

1	police report, is there?
2	A No, sir.
3	Q Now, when J came and identified himself,
4	
5	A No, sir.
6	Q He didn't give you any indication he was
7	going to flee, did he?
8	A No, sir.
9	Q None of the arrest warrants that you were
10	there to serve were for violent crimes, were they?
11	A No.
12	Q So when Jame identified himself at the door,
13	you and Officer Sentered the home, correct?
14	A No, not immediately. I guess the breezeway,
15	is that what you are saying?
16	Q Well, we've established that the breezeway is
17	connected to the home, right, sir?
18	A Since he opened the door, yes. I informed him
19	he had arrest warrants for him.
20	Q Well, whether the door is open or closed, the
21	breezeway is still connected to the home, right?
22	A Yes.
23	Q Not an area you would expect a passerby to
24	just walk into, correct?
25	A Correct.

1 It's an area that they maintain a privacy Q interest in, right? 2 3 Yes, sir. THE COURT: Before we go on so that I'm clear 4 and the record is clear, when you first came to the 5 home, you went to the side entrance where the 6 7 breezeway was. Was the door shut? 8 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 9 THE COURT: What did you do? Did you call out? My understanding is you called out to an 10 individual who was sleeping, right? 11 12 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 13 THE COURT: What happened then? 14 THE WITNESS: Before that we went to the 15 front door and got no answer. I then went to the side 16 He immediately awakened and I asked him, "Is Jame here," and he said, "yes." 17 18 THE COURT: When you were speaking to him, was the door shut to the breezeway? 19 20 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 21 THE COURT: Were you standing inside or outside the breezeway? 22 23 THE WITNESS: Outside. 24 THE COURT: Was there a point in time that 25 you entered the breezeway?

1	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
2	THE COURT: And when did that happen?
3	THE WITNESS: When Japan opened the door for
4	us.
5	THE COURT: Was that after he went and you
6	say James.
7	THE WITNESS: Mr. W.
8	THE COURT: Mr. West, okay. So he came to
9	the door and opened the door to the breezeway and you
10	entered at that point.
11	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
12	THE COURT: Did you recognize him as the
13	defendant, as someone that was a subject to the
14	warrants?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir, from the picture that
16	we had in our file.
17	THE COURT: Did he also identify himself by
18	name?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
20	THE COURT: Was it after that you entered the
21	breezeway?
22	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
23	THE COURT: All right. Counsel continue.
24	CONT'D CROSS:
25	Q Sir, you didn't ask J to step outside the

1	home, correct?
2	A No.
3	Q And he was being cooperative we've
4	established, correct?
5	A Yes.
6	Q He gave no indication that he was going to
7	flee when he answered the door, did he?
8	A No, sir.
9	Q Jame was then placed under arrest, right?
10	A Verbally, not handcuffed.
11	Q You've gone out of your way to say that sir,
12	but my question is was J placed under arrest?
13	A Yes, sir.
14	Q And your report makes no mention of only
15	being verbally arrested, right?
16	A Right.
17	Q A verbal arrest, is that something that is
18	common?
19	A When I inform someone that they are under
20	arrest, that's enough to let them know they are not
21	free to leave.
22	Q A verbal arrest is different than actually
23	placing someone under arrest, isn't it?
24	A Being handcuffed, but a verbal arrest is the
25	same as being informed he has warrants and he is under

arrest.

Q When you hear an officer say --

MS. Land I I am going to object at this point. I think we are getting into the legal argument which is for Counsel and myself to argue before the Court. The officer has been very clear that he told Mr. We he was under arrest, but he wasn't handcuffed. Any other legal argument should be dealt with in oral argument before Your Honor.

THE COURT: The Rules of Court actually recognize a custodial and noncustodial arrest so I will sustain the objection. You can continue your questioning.

Q Sir, if you had an officer tell you, "I placed that man under arrest," you would presume that they put handcuffs on them, wouldn't you?

A No, sir.

Q You wouldn't?

A No.

Q It was after J was placed under arrest that he was asked if his girlfriend C was home, right?

A No. We walked to the back bedroom. I located her -- located somebody sleeping in the bed.

Q So it would be a lie to say J was asked

1	about Common once he was placed under arrest?
2	A I did not ask her I did not ask ask him
3	about Calledon.
4	Q Did your partner Officer Section ask him
5	about Common once he was placed under arrest?
6	A I did not hear if he did or did not.
7	Q Well, you were standing next to him at the
8	time, weren't you, sir?
9	A Yes.
10	Q It was soon after James was placed under
11	arrest, that he lead you and Officer Same to the
12	bedroom that he shared with Common, correct?
13	A Yes, sir.
14	Q It was there you found Campa laying in bed?
15	A Yes, sir.
16	Q She was then advised she was under arrest for
17	the warrants that you were at the home to serve,
18	correct?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q And Walliam, the man who answered the door,
21	he remained at the scene after you entered the home?
22	A In the breezeway.
23	Q Is that a yes?
24	A Yes, sir.
25	Q You could have asked Walley to get College,

1	couldn't you?
2	A I wasn't too sure if she was there or not.
3	Q Well, sir, you weren't sure if Jewer was
4	there when he came to the door right?
5	A That was the first person that I asked when I
6	asked if James was here. When the fax came over, it
7	was for James Western.
8	Q My question is, sir, when you knocked at the
9	door, were you sure that Jame was there?
10	A No, sir.
11	Q And despite not being sure if James was
12	there, you asked Waller to get James, right?
13	A Yes.
14	Q So to return to my previous question, you
15	could have asked Wallan to get College for you
16	despite not being sure whether or not she was there?
17	A I could have.
18	Q Yes?
19	A I could have, yes.
20	Q You could have asked W
21	for James if he needed one, right?
22	A I didn't request him he asked for the shirt.
23	I didn't ask for a shirt.
24	Q My question is, sir, there was nothing that
25	stopped you from asking Walliam to get a shirt for

1	Jame if he needed one, correct?
2	A It's Jame room. It would have been up to
3	Jame to ask Waller I wouldn't have asked somebody
4	to go in somebody else's room to get something.
5	Q But there was nothing from stopping you from
6	doing so?
7	MS. Landroom. It's been asked and
8	answered.
9	A I wouldn't do that, sir, if that is what you're
10	asking me. I wouldn't ask somebody else to get
11	someone else's belongings.
12	THE COURT: I think the officer has answered
13	the question.
14	Q If Walliam got Common for you as he got
15	James, you would have no reason to step into the
16	house, correct?
17	A Mr. Was asked for a shirt. He asked to get
18	dressed.
19	Q Let's pretend for a moment he didn't ask
20	MS. Land I'm going to object. This
21	is now a hypothetical.
22	THE COURT: I will sustain the objection.
23	What's at issue here is what happened.
24	Q You never asked Walland for College, right?
25	A No sir

1	Q And you were there to serve warrants for
2	Company as well?
3	A If I located her. If she was there, yes.
4	Q Same thing for James, if he was there, right?
5	A Yes, sir.
6	Q Your purpose for going there was to serve
7	arrest warrants on both of them, right?
8	A The fax came over for James so the Sheriff's
9	Department often does that.
10	MR. SISTO: Your Honor, I am going to object
11	to that. It's unresponsive.
12	MS. Land : I think it is responsive.
13	THE COURT: It's cross examination. Just
14	listen to the question and answer it as best you can.
15	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
16	Q Your purpose in going to the home was to
17	serve arrest warrants on James and College, correct?
18	A Yes, sir.
19	Q Now, James was seated on a chair in the
20	bedroom while you waited for Common to get dressed,
21	correct?
22	A Yes.
23	Q And you're saying he wasn't in handcuffs at
24	the time, right?
25	A Correct.

1	MR. SISTO: I'd like the record to reflect I
2	am showing opposing Counsel D-1 for identification.
3	May I approach the witness?
4	THE COURT: Yes, you may.
5	Q Sir, I am showing you what has been marked
6	D-1 for identification. Can you take a look at it,
7	please?
8	A Yes, sir.
9	Q This is one of the reports that you generated
10	from the date in question, correct?
11	A Yes.
12	Q You know that because your signature and name
13	are at the bottom, right?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q Your testimony thus far has been that
16	although James was placed under arrest when he
17	entered, this was a verbal arrest, right?
18	A Yes, sir.
19	Q You would agree looking at your report you
20	can look at this. We are half way down the page.
21	These are your words: "Moments later, a black male
22	came to the front door identifying himself as Jame H.
23	Walter," right?
24	A Yes, sir.
25	Q Your next line, "PO Same and myself

1	stepped through the doorway into the breezeway,"
2	right?
3	A Yes.
4	Q And the next line is, "At this time, I
5	advised Mr. Wester he had warrants out for his arrest
6	and placed him under arrest," right?
7	A Yes, sir.
8	Q Those are your exact words, "placed him under
9	arrest," right?
10	A Yes, sir.
11	Q Now, when you talk about a verbal arrest,
12	you're talking about your words, right, telling him
13	you're under arrest?
14	A Yes.
15	Q And despite you using the term, "placed him
16	under arrest," you're saying that he wasn't placed in
17	handcuffs at that time?
18	A Correct.
19	Q You realize he was placed under arrest at the
20	time strike that. We will get to that later.
21	Both you and Officer Sanatons were with Janes
22	and College in the bedroom, correct?
23	A Correct.
24	Q Sergeant Manage was with Walland by the
25	front door?

1	A Correct.
2	Q So there were three officers inside the home
3	while you were in James bedroom, correct?
4	A Correct.
5	Q Now, the gun that is at issue here was seized
6	by Officer Section?
7	A Correct.
8	Q It was seized from a closet in the hallway
9	right?
10	A Yes, sir.
11	Q That is distinct from any closets that would
12	have been inside the bedroom, right?
13	A Yes, sir.
14	Q At the time the gun was seized from the
15	hallway closet, James was in the bedroom, right?
16	A Right.
17	Q You were in the bedroom?
18	A Yes, sir
19	Q College was in the bedroom?
20	A In the bathroom.
21	Q The bathroom is connected to the bedroom?
22	A Yes, sir.
23	Q Officer Section was in the bedroom, right?
24	A Yes, sir.
25	Q Again, James was placed under arrest right

1	after he presented himself at the front door, right?
2	A Yes, sir.
3	Q Then some words were exchanged with him,
4	right?
5	A Yes.
6	Q You then accompanied James down a long
7	hallway to the bedroom?
8	A Yes.
9	Q Once you entered, some words were exchanged
10	with Carren?
11	A Yes, sir.
12	Q Some time passed while College was getting
13	dressed?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q It was during this time Officer Same
16	observed the bullets on the dresser, right?
17	A Yes, sir.
18	Q After he saw the bullets, some words were
19	exchanged with James, correct.
20	A Yes, sir.
21	Q And it was then that Officer S
22	searched the hall closet and found the gun, right?
23	A Yes, sir.
24	Q You conceded that both James and Comments had
25	arrest warrants for nonviolent offenses, right?

1	A The warrants for that day, yes, sir.
2	Q And you also conceded they weren't even for
3	what we refer to as indictable offenses, right?
4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q For municipal court matters?
6	A No, no. There was a criminal warrant from the
7	county that he had and Canal had a bad checks
8	warrant out of some town. I don't recall. I would of
9	to look at my report, sir.
10	Q Feel free to refer to it. My question is
11	were any of their warrants for indictable offenses?
12	A No, sir.
13	Q Commun's warrants again, just like J
14	were for nonviolent municipal court matters, right?
15	A Yes, sir.
16	Q You allowed Walland James to leave your
17	sight when he went back in the house to get James,
18	right?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q You had no reason to believe that W
21	presented a danger at that time, right?
22	A No, sir.
23	Q You walked down a long hallway to get from
24	the front door to Jame' bedroom right?
25	A You said he did or I did?

1	Q Both of you did, right?
2	A Yes.
3	Q And the bedroom was located in the rear of
4	the home?
5	A Yes.
6	Q And you walked from the front of the home to
7	the rear of the home, right?
8	A More of the side of the home. More of the side
9	of the home to the other side of the home. It's a
10	ranch.
11	Q Okay. You covered almost the entire home
12	from one side to the other, right?
13	A Yes.
14	Q There's just a garage to the right of the
15	ranch?
16	A Yes, sir.
17	Q You had no indication any one was in the
18	garage, did you?
19	A Not that I knew of.
20	Q During that walk from one side of the house
21	to the other, there was no indication that any one
22	other than Collision was in the home, right?
23	A I wasn't sure.
24	Q Did you hear anything that indicated someone
25	was in the home?

other person that this was important. In any event, I

1	A I didn't hear anything, but the doors were
2	closed.
3	Q Sir, isn't it true that whenever you enter
4	someone's home, you never know for sure whether there
5	are additional people inside?
6	A Yes, sir.
7	Q You would need X-ray vision for that, right,

10	Q For which your department doesn't provided,
11	correct?
12	A Yes.
13	Q And you understand that this uncertainty,
14	this inherent uncertainty when you enter the home,
15	that doesn't give you a right to search the home,
16	correct?
17	MS. LANARDAKE: I am going to object. I
18	don't know if we are talking about factual scenarios
19	and again, we are getting into
20	THE COURT: It's a legal conclusion. What is
21	at issue here is what this officer did. What he
22	believed the law may or may not have been to the

17	identification. May I approach the witness, Your
18	Honor?
19	THE COURT: Yes.
20	Q Sir, I am showing you what's been marked D-3
21	for identification. Please take a look at it.
22	A Yes, sir.
23	Q Your testimony is that an Officer Menae
24	Faredman was not at the scene on the day in question?
25	A Yes, sir.

1	Q And Officer James Delators was not at the
2	scene on the day in question?
3	A Yes, sir.
4	Q Now, this is a General Complaint from your

24	A Yes.
25	Q It talks about him being dispatched at 5:26

2	A Yes.

8	A Yes.
9	Q It's listed twice actually, right?
10	A Twice.
11	Q And both times, it lists your arrival time at
12	the scene at 5:26 a.m., right?
13	A 5:26, yes, sir.
14	Q And both times it lists your time as clearing

4	Q And you testified on direct that you were
5	not familiar with Mr. Was prior to arriving at that
6	home?
7	A I never had any contact with him before, sir.
8	Q My question was you were not familiar with
9	him at all?
10	A No, sir.
11	MR. SISTO: Your Honor, I'd like to have this
12	marked for identification.
13	THE COURT: Okay.
14	(Whereupon, a transcript, dated September 30,
15	2008, was marked D-4 for identification.)
16	Let the record reflect I am showing what has
17	been marked D-4 for identification to opposing
18	Counsel.
19	Q Sir, some minutes have passed with regard to
20	your testimony with the prosecutor on direct, but you
21	had indicated that you were not familiar with Mr.
22	Wesley prior to the day in question, correct?
23	A Yes.
24	Q I am showing you D-4 for identification.
25	Would you take a look at it, please? You don't need

1	to read the whole thing. It's a transcript of your
2	grand jury testimony, right?
3	A I would have to read it, sir.
4	Q Take as much time as you need. Just let me
5	know that you are ready.
6	A minute so far has passed. It appears to be
7	a transcript of your grand jury testimony, correct?
8	A Okay, sir. I don't recall the testimony, but I
9	am reading it.
10	Q Okay. The front page of this document reads,
11	"Before the Ocean County Grand Jury," correct?
12	A Correct.
13	Q When I open it up, there is one witness
14	listed for the State, correct?
15	A Correct.
16	Q It reads Patrolman Amend Senators, that is
17	you, correct?
18	A That is me, yes, sir.
19	Q You have no reason to believe that this
20	document has been falsified, do you?
21	A No, sir.
22	Q I am going to direct your attention to the
23	very last page, page eight. You were placed under
24	oath when you testified before the grand jury, right?
25	A Yes.

1	Q Just like you were placed under oath today,
2	correct?
3	A Yes.
4	Q Returning to my original question before that
5	dealt with this document. You testified at the time
6	you went to the home, you were not familiar with J
7	Wester, right?
8	A Right.
9	Q And you were asked before the grand jury
10	questions by Ms. Water, that is a prosecutor, right?
11	A Yes, sir.
12	Q "Officer, was it your understanding Mr.
13	Waster and Ms. Mestude had been residing in that
14	residence for quite some time." Your answer, "Yes,
15	they had," right?
16	A Yes, sir, that is what I answered.
17	Q Then, "Question, do you know approximately
18	how long?" You answered, "Personally, I know they
19	lived there for at least three years," right?
20	A Correct, sir.
21	Q You testified before the grand jury on
22	September 30, 2008, right?
23	A Correct, sir.
24	Q So at least three years before then would be
25	some time in 2005, right?

1	A Correct, sir.
2	Q Essentially, your testimony was that you knew
3	that Jame Wallet lived at that residence?
4	A I knew where he lived, yes, sir.
5	Q Now, you also testified during direct that
6	Mr. War came to the door in his underwear, right?
7	A I believe it was underwear, a pair of shorts,
8	something like that. He asked to get dressed.
9	Q You didn't say anything about a pair of
10	shorts on direct, did you?
11	A Sir?
12	Q Do you recall saying anything about a pair of
13	shorts?
14	A Shorts, boxers, underwear. I refer to them as
15	the same. That is what most people wear to bed.
16	Q And your testimony is that Mr. Wasser asked
17	to get dressed, correct?
18	A Correct.
19	Q You wrote a detailed police report about the
20	day in question, correct?
21	A Correct.
22	Q No where in that report does it say anything
23	about James asking to get dressed, does it?
24	A I'd have to refer to my report, sir.
25	MR. SISTO: If the record could reflect I am

showing opposing Counsel D-2 for identification. 1 2 May I approach the witness? THE COURT: 3 Yes. Sir, I see that you have a copy of your Q 4 report. 5 I do. 6 7 I would ask that you turn that over during your testimony. I'm going to show you what has been 8 9 marked D-2 for identification. This is a copy of your 10 report, right? Yes, sir. 11 12 Q The one that you were just looking at when I approached you? 13 Yes, sir. 14 15 My original question to you is this. Q 16 Anywhere in that detailed report, does it say anything about James asking to get dressed? 17 18 No, sir. 19 It doesn't say anything about that in your 20 report now that you've had time to look at it, correct? 21 22 In my report, no sir. 23 Sir, you also testified during direct that 24 you would not have gone into the residence, but for 25 which you say was James request to get dressed,

correct?

A Correct.

Q Now, isn't it true, sir, you went there with the intention to arrest College Manager as well?

A If she was present, yes, sir.

Q So when you said that you wouldn't have gone in, but for James request, you then followed up by stating that you would have taken him to the police station, right?

A I don't follow, sir.

Q You said during direct examination your testimony was that but for James request to get dressed, we would have just taken him to the police station from the front door, correct?

A Yes, sir.

Q That would have left Miss Manage in the residence, correct?

A Correct.

Q And you were there to serve her with an arrest warrant as well, correct?

A Well, we would have worked it differently. We would have asked Mr. James if she was there or we would have asked him if she was there afterwards.

Q You never asked Mr. January if she was there, though.

17	that James made the statement about it belonging to
18	James 's brother, correct?
19	A Correct, sir.
20	MR. SISTO: May the record reflect I am
21	showing D-2 for identification to opposing Counsel.
22	May I approach the witness, Your Honor?
23	THE COURT: Yes.
24	Q I am showing you what has been marked D-2 for
25	identification, correct?

1	A Correct.
2	Q This is your police report?
3	A Yes.
4	Q And what we have established is that your
5	testimony today has been that it was after you seized
6	the gun that James made the statement that the gun
7	belonged to Jahren's brother right?
8	A Correct, sir.
9	Q Now, I draw your attention to this report.
10	The second to the last paragraph, the top line, about
11	14 lines down, okay?
12	A Okay.
13	Q What it says in there is this, sir: "This
14	Officer advised Officer G
15	at which time Waster stated the gun was in the
16	closet." That's what it says, right?
17	A Yes.
18	Q And then we move down in the report, right?
19	A Correct.
20	Q Down lower in the report, it then says,
21	"This Officer looked into the closet and observed a
22	semi-automatic, long barreled rifle," right?

24	Q So it was actually after James allegedly made
25	the statement?

1	A I was incorrect. It's what he said first and

3	Q Can I have that back, sir?

7	A Right. I said I was incorrect, yes, sir.
8	Q Sir, it was after Jame was placed under
9	arrest, that he was asked if his girlfriend College
10	was home, right?
11	A I don't recall, sir.
12	MR. SISTO: May I approach the witness?
13	THE COURT: Yes.
14	Q I am showing you D-2 for identification.
15	Again, this is your police report I am showing you,

4	Q So again, sir, it was after James was placed
.5	under arrest when he was asked if Callian, was at the
.6	residence, right?
L7	A Right, sir.
L8	Q James then replied that Called was in bed,
19	right?
20	A Yes.
21	Q You and Officer Games then accompanied
22	Jame to the bedroom, right?
23	A Correct.
24	Q Your purpose in going into the bedroom was to
25	arrest College for her active warrants, correct?

1	A If she was down there, yes, she was going to be
2	arrested.
3	Q Now, again, sir, with respect to detailed
4	report, you didn't note anything in that report about
5	Jame going to the bedroom to get a T-shirt, did you?
6	A About who getting a T-shirt?
7	Q James.
8	A Jame just asked to get dressed. He didn't
9	specify which clothes. He just requested if he can
10	get dressed.
11	Q We previously established that there is
12	nothing in your report about him asking to get
13	dressed, right?
14	A Correct, sir.
15	Q Now, Walley James remained on the scene
16	after you went to the home, right?
17	A He is the gentleman that laid back on the couch
18	on the breezeway.
19	Q Was that a yes?
20	A You're asking me if he remained in the
21	residence?
22	Q On the scene in the residence.
23	A I am telling you he was in the breezeway.
24	Q The breezeway. He remained in the breezeway
25	of the home, correct?

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1	A Correct, sir.
2	Q While you were in the bedroom, Sergeant
3	Manage was with William?
4	A Sergeant Meaning was with Mr. January.
5	Q The breezeway is connected to the front door;
6	is it not, sir?
7	A Yes.
8	Q My question is while you were in the bedroom,
9	Sergeant was with William at the front door?
10	A I don't know if they were by the front door. I

14	Q James told you that the gun in the closet
15	belongs to Warran Jahnson's brother, right?
16	A He made that statement, sir.
17	Q James was in the bedroom when he made that
18	statement, right?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q You would agree that Walland Jahrson was with
21	Sergeant Manager in the breezeway when James made that
22	statement?
23	A Yes, sir.
24	Q It was after James made that statement that
25	you walked through the long hallway back to the

1	breezeway, right?
2	A After James made that statement, I walked
3	you're asking me if I walked down the hallway into the
4	breezeway?
5	Q Yes.
6	A No. After James made that statement, I opened
7	the closet door, removed the weapon and cleared it.
8	Q And after that, you walked back to the
9	breezeway, right?
10	A Not at that point.
11	Q Well, you did advise Sergeant Meller of the
12	gun you found, right?
13	A Later on I did. That is correct.
14	Q Sergeant Manual was on the breezeway,
15	correct?
16	A Correct.
17	Q It was then that Walland Johnson stated that
18	the gun belonged to his brother, right?
19	A That's what he said, yes, sir.
20	Q That is exactly what James said, right?
